Die Fledermaus and the Gilbert & Sullivan Connection

Die Fledermaus is one of the most celebrated operettas of all time, and one of the distinct highlights of Johann Strauss II's extraordinary career. The story is based on *Le Réveillon*, a three-act play written in 1872 by Henri Meilhac and Ludovia Halevy, centering around the 19th century French tradition of breaking a daylong fast with a festive meal following Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve. But Strauss wasn't the only one to borrow from *Le Réveillon*.

In 1873, W.S. Gilbert was a comedy playwright of considerable renown. He had collaborated with Arthur Sullivan two years before in the production of *Thespis* (a show the Madison Savoyards has never presented because Sullivan's original score completely disappeared decades ago). But the two were not yet an established team: that would have to wait until Richard D'Oyly Carte combined them for *Trial by Jury* in 1875. But in 1873 Gilbert was in the midst of what was described as a "mini-career" translating foreign works, one of which was *Le Réveillon*. However, Gilbert shortened the work by removing the masked ball scene, for fear it was too bawdy and risqué. The result was the two-act farce *Committed for Trial*, which opened at the Globe Theater in January 1874, three months before the premiere of *Die Fledermaus*.

Several years later Gilbert was commissioned by Charles Wyndham, the star and manager of the Criterion Theater to expand the play, and to re-insert the masked ball scene since, as The Times put it, "everyone knew what had been omitted anyway." Wyndham was regarded by many, including George Bernard Shaw and Oscar Wilde, as the foremost actor of modern comedy. The result was *On Bail*, a three-act play that opened in February 1877, and ran for about five weeks. Wyndham wanted to advertise the play as an original work, but Gilbert insisted, successfully, that it be labelled an adaptation.

In the 55 years Madison Savoyards has existed, I guesstimate we have employed over 1000 artisans who have given much of their time, talents, and energy to this company. If you are one of them who helped us make it to this point, thank you for your hard work and dedication. Madison Savoyards would not exist without these folks and their craft.

Additionally, it is exciting to think of the thousands of folks who have donated to Madison Savoyards from across the globe! None of this would be possible without the generous support of our donors past and present who believe in the mission and vision of the

company. As public funding for the arts is reduced, donor contributions become increasingly more important. I am truly grateful to our granting organizations for their generosity and assistance. Moreover, Gilbert's plays, burlesques, and theatrical translations are rife with his unique wit and wordplay which we know and love from the works with Sullivan. We chose to perform *Fledermaus* with his translation as a celebration of our past and a potential bridge to our future.
