The Savoyards

The success of the Gilbert & Sullivan operas prompted their business manager, Richard D'Oyly Carte, to build a theater for them in the heart of London. He chose the site of the ancient Savoy Palace and built the first theater in the world to be lit by electricity. It opened on October 10, 1881 with the transplanted Patience. The first opera to premiere in the Savoy Theatre was lolanthe. The works of Gilbert and Sullivan are so closely associated with the theater that they are often called the "Savoy Operas," and devotees of these operas are called "Savoyards."

Argument

Act I

When Prince Hilarion, son of King Hildebrand, was two years old he was married, without being consulted, to Princess Ida, age one, daughter of King Gama. Ida is now 21 and the day has come for her to be presented to her bridegroom. King Gama arrives at Hildebrand's castle with his three doltish sons but no Ida. Gama explains that Ida operates Castle Adamant, a women's university from which all men are excluded. Hildebrand is furious and he orders Gama and his sons held hostage while Hilarion and his friends, Florian and Cyril, go off to Castle Adamant to win Ida with.

"dainty triolet, fragant violet, gentle heigh-ho-let (or little sigh)."

In Scene 2, the young men enter the castle unobserved. Conveniently finding three academic gowns, they put them on and try to pass as new students. Ida is fooled and she welcomes them to the school.

Act II

Lady Blanche, more experienced than Ida, realizes at once that the three new students are men. Her daughter Melissa discovers that she likes men and begins to work on her mother's ambitions to be the next head of the university. She suggests to Blanche that if Ida accepts Hilarion, Lady Blanche will then rule Castle Adamant. A picnic follows, during which Ida suddenly discovers the trio's true identity and falls into the local river. Hilarion saves her but Ida insists that all three be arrested. At that very moment King Hildebrand and his men, "walls and fences scaling", storm the castle. The women of Adamant sing their defiance, but they have little taste for fighting.

Ida learns that her ladies, though well-educated, are useless as soldiers and the Princess becomes discouraged. King Gama, still held hostage, suggests that his three sons fight Hilarion and his friends and that the outcome of this ordeal shall decide Ida's fate. Reluctantly, she agrees. The brothers are rather easily overpowered and Ida agrees to accept Hilarion and let Blanche rule. Adamant. She concedes that, "it were profanity/for poor humanity/to treat as vanity/the sway of love."

Directors' Notes

Princess Ida, the eighth of the Gilbert and Sullivan collaborations, was first produced in 1884 and has been among the least often revived. Its lively story and lovely music deserve a fresh approach to its production, cutting its lengthy blank verse dialogue in half, avoiding the tendency to stage it lavishly with three settings and medieval costumes, and altering its awkward three-act shape to the more customary two-act form with a single intermission. In our production each act will be performed in two scenes. No musical numbers have been deleted.

Princess Ida, though based upon Tennyson's poem, The Princess, more closely resembles Shakespeare's Love's Labour's Lost.








Christopher McGahan

Ronald Mitchell (Stage Director) After marking his retirement from the UW-Madison in 1975 by directing Richard Strauss's Capriccio in Old Music Hall, Ronald Mitchell later staged Cimarosa's The Secret Marriage and Gluck's Iphigenia In Tauris, also in Music Hall. He directed Ruddigore (78) for Madison Savoyards in the Wisconsin Union Theater and, more recently, Shakespeare's The Merchant Of Venice and A Midsummer Night's Dream at the Colorado Shakespeare Festival.

Christopher McGahan (Music Director) is an Assistant Professor of Music at Bucknell University, where he also serves as Music Director of the University Orchestra, Chapel Choir and Collegium Musicum and is University Organist. McGahan was Music Director of the Unitarian-Universalist Society of Urbana-Champaign and he was staff conductor, vocal coach and chorus master of the Illinois Opera Theatre while working towards a Doctor of Musical Arts degree. McGahan has conducted the Madison Chamber Choir and Orchestra in Bach's St. John's Passion and Mozart's Requiem and worked with the Waukesha Symphony Orchestra. While earning a Master of Music degree from the U.W., he studied voice with Bettina Bjorksten. He studied conducting as a Rockefeller Fellow at the Aspen Festival, and has made guest conducting appearances in many parts of the country.





Perry Allaire (King Hildebrand) A native of Green Bay, Perry Allaire is a graduate of the U.W. School of Music. He has appeared in numerous roles with the U.W. Opera, most recently as Vicar Gedge in Britten's Albert Herring. His Madison Savoyards credits include the Bo's'un's Mate in H.M.S. Pinafore, Sir Despard Murgatroyd in Ruddigore and Private Willis in Iolanthe. A past Vice-President and a current member of the Savoyards Board of Directors, he prepared the chorus and sang the role of the Judge in the Savoyards' University League Benefit performance of Trial By Jury.

John Staley (Hilarion) Appearing for the first time with Madison Savoyards, John Staley is a recent graduate in music education from the UW-Madison where he participated in UW Opera productions of Iphigenia In Tauris and Candide. He performed as soloist in the UW Choral Union performance of Schubert's Mass In E-Flat. His music-theater activities include roles in Mame, Hello Dolly, Man Of La Mancha and The Unsinkable Molly Brown.

Richard Knowles (King Gama) During the past year Madison theater-goers have heard Richard Knowles as Lord Mountararat in Gilbert & Sullivan's Iolanthe, as Super-intendent Budd in Britten's Albert Herring and as Colline in Puccini's La Boheme. In past seasons with the Madison Savoyards he has also sung the title role in The Mikado, Major-General Stanley in The Pirates Of Penzance, Sir Joseph Porter in H.M.S. Pinafore and Old Adam Goodheart in Ruddigore. Mr. Knowles is a Professor of English at the University of Wisconsin.

Audrey Highton (Princess Ida) Appearing for the first time with Madison Savoyards, Audrey Highton has sung leading roles with the Verdi Square Opera, New York City, the Vermont Opera Theater and the Pittsburgh Opera Festival. In Madison she has portrayed Miss Silverpearl in Mozart's The Impresario for Madison Civic Opera; Miss Wordsworth in Albert Herring and Sister Jane in the Brecht/Weill Happy End, both for the UW Opera; and Nina Grieg in The Song Of Norway in Mt. Horeb. She has directed for Equity Library Theater, Theater 22 and the Golden Fleece Limited, all in New York City. Presently she works as arts administrator for Madison's Art Place/Center Gallery and as Producer and Artistic Director for Opera Seen, an educational opera touring company.



Conrad Hutterli (Cyril) A resident of Madison since 1972, Conrad Hutterli first appeared with Madison Savoyards in Iolanthe ('79). He has sung in the University of Wisconsin Chorale, the University Catholic Center Folk Choir, in various coffee houses, in a touring group, the Celebration Singers, and on a studio choir recording of

contemporary liturgical music. A UW-Madison graduate with a B.A. in Journalism and an M.A. in Public Administration, he presently works as an insurance underwriter for the American Family Insurance Group.

T. James Weger (Florian) is studying voice at the U.W.-Madison under John Gilmore. He appeared in La Boheme last winter singing the role of Schaunard and has appeared as a soloist with the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra and the Middleton Civic Chorus. He is a member of the August Chorale and plans to continue his studies next fall with Nicolo Rossi-Lemeni at Indiana University.

Nancy Stofflet (Lady Blanche) Nancy Stofflet first performed with Madison Savoyards in 1978 as Dame Hannah in Ruddigore. A 1976 graduate of the UW-Madison, she completed a double major in elementary education and special education and has worked in the area of elementary learning disabilities in the Green Bay and Sun Prairie school systems. At the UW she was active in both Concert Choir and Chamber Singers and has performed major roles in Falstaff and The Tales Of Hoffman with the UW Opera. An active vocal soloist in the Fox Valley and Madison areas, Ms. Stofflet will pursue her studies in the coming year on a scholarship at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

Anne Wright Coffman (Psyche) A veteran of six Madison Savoyards productions, Anne Wright Coffman's previous roles include Rose Maybud in Ruddigore and Peep Bo in The Mikado. Her behind-the-scenes activities include programs, publicity, and serving as Savoyards' President in 1974. A graduate of the UW School of Music, Ms. Coffman has appeared in the UW Opera production of The Marriage Of Figaro in the role of Susanna. In Providence, Rhode Island she premiered the role of Anne Foster in What Have You Got To Lose; at the Boris Goldovsky Opera Workshop she has portrayed Hansel in Hansel And Gretel and Cherubino in The Marriage Of Figaro. A native of Madison, she has recently appeared in recital at the UW with her husband, Paul Schmidt.



Paul Schmidt (Arac) Appearing in his fifth Savoyards production, Paul Schmidt also served as Production Manager for The Mikado and as Assistant Music Director for H.M.S. Pinalore. A 1979 graduate of Brown University, where he has appeared as a soloist with the Beaver Dam Oratorio Society, at the Baroque Music Festival in Eagle River, Wisconsin and with other groups. In 1976 he was a national audition winner of the American Society of Choral Conductors and he has appeared for three seasons with Artists Internationale, the resident opera company of Providence, Rhode Island. A Wisconsin native, his recent activities include giving a joint recital with his wife, Anne Wright Coffman and serving as interim organist at the First Baptist Church.

Tom Cleary (Scynthius) has been a ghost and a Peer in Savoyards productions of Ruddigore and lolanthe.

Paul Ohmen (Guron) is appearing with the Savoyards for the first time this summer.

Laura Croen (Melissa) A native of Milwaukee where she has performed with the Milwaukee Conservatory Singers, Ms. Croen presently is a senior in the UW-Madison School of Music majoring in applied voice, with additional studies in Ballet, Jazz and Modern Dance. During a summer at Interlochen she appeared in The Mikado and Trial By Jury; she performed in Madison Savoyards' H.M.S. Pinafore; and she has appeared in several UW Opera productions including Falstaff, The Tales Of Hoffman, The Elixir Of Love and Iphigenia In Tauris. This past season she was featured as Mrs. Herring in Britten's Albert Herring.

Charlotte Mullen (Sacharissa) has been in seven Savoyards productions since 1971.
She sings with Choral Union and has appeared with the Stoughton Village Players and Sun Prairie Civic Theater. Her singing activities were interrupted when she ran away with the circus in 1974.

Jeannie Jerde (Chloe) Jeannie Jerde has been performing with Madison Savoyards since 1977, appearing in H.M.S. Pinafore (77), Ruddigore (78) and Iolanthe (79). She has performed in the Madison Civic Opera chorus in productions of Faust (78) and Aida (80) and in the UW Choral Union performance of The Passion According To St. Matthew (80) by J.S. Bach. Ms. Jerde presently teaches sixth grade in Watertown, Wisconsin.
