A Room in a Lodging House

Sergeant Bouncer, an old soldier, has a scheme to get double rent from a single room. By day, he lets it to Mr. Box (a printer who is out all night) and by night to Mr. Cox (a hatter who works all day). Whenever either of them asks any awkward questions, he sings at length about his days in the militia.

His plan works well until Mr. Cox is, unexpectedly, given a day's holiday singing,

My master is punctual always in business; Unpunctuality, even slight, is in his Eyes such a crime that on showing my phiz in his Shop, I thought there'd be the devil to pay.

My aged employer, with his physiognomy Shining from soap like a star in astronomy, Said, "Mister Cox, you'll oblige me and honour me If you will take this as your holiday."

Visions of Bascom and back and of Orfordville, Cheap fare excursions, already the squash I feel; Fearing the rain, put on my Macin-tosh I will; Now for my breakfast, my light de-jeu-nay.

The two lodgers meet. Left alone while Bouncer sorts out another room, they discover they share more than the same bed. Cox is engaged to the widow Penelope Ann Wiggins - a fate that Box escaped by pretending to commit suicide.

Now they both try to disclaim her! She sends a letter to inform them that she intends to marry a Mr. Knox! Relieved, Cox and Box swear eternal friendship and discover, curiously enough, that they are long-lost brothers.



The Sorcerer, The Argument

ACT I

Exterior of Sir Marmaduke's Mansion, Mid-day

It is mid-day and the villagers of Ploverleigh are assembled in front of the Elizabethan mansion of Sir Marmaduke Pointdextre, voicing their joy at the betrothal of Sir Marmaduke's heir Alexis to Aline, the only child of an equally aristocratic neighbour, the Lady Sangazure. There is one present, however, who does not share in the general joy. Constance, the daughter of Mrs. Partlet, is downcast and confesses to her mother that she loves (vainly, it seems) the Vicar, Dr. Daly. On his appearance they withdraw and Dr. Daly sings the notable ballad, "Time was when Love and I were well acquainted," in which he laments the days now gone when, as a pale young curate, he had the adoration of the maidens of his flock. Mrs. Partlet, anxious to help Constance, comes forward and leads the conversation to the subject of marriage, but it is obvious from his replies that he looks on himself as a confirmed bachelor, and Constance is led away sobbing by her mother.

The Vicar now turns to welcome Sir Marmaduke and Alexis in weighty language, and with a touch of allegory that pleases Sir Marmaduke, who is a great admirer of the school of stately compliment, and a stickler for "blue blood." He claims that his own family is directly descended from Helen of Troy, and is all for a marriage of pedigree, regarding love as a comparatively unimportant accessory.

Aline makes her appearance and is greeted by the village girls. She acknowledges their good wishes, and her mother, Lady Sangazure, adds her congratulations. The men now welcome Alexis and the lovers greet each other with ecstasy. Then follows a stately duet ("Welcome joy, adieu to sadness") between Sir Marmaduke and Lady Sangazure, who were lovers in their young days. The stately gavotte measure is punctuated by their dreams of what might have been.

A notary has now arrived, all is prepared for signing the marriage contract. This done, Alexis and Aline are left together. Alexis does not agree with the views of his father, and, believing that men and women should be coupled in matrimony without distinction of rank, has done some propaganda on the subject. So far, however, his ideas have only been welcomed by the humbler classes. His own happiness seeming assured, he reveals his scheme for making the whole village happy. He has engaged John Wellington Wells, a Sorcerer, to administer secretly a love-philtre to all the others, which will first send them to sleep, and on their awaking cause them to fall madly in love with the first person of the opposite sex they may see who has also drunk the potion. It has no effect on those already married.

Mr. Wells is introduced in the well-known patter song, and then details are discussed. It is decided that the philtre shall be placed in a large teapot which will be used for the "banquet" to follow. Mr. Wells then proceeds to his horrific incantation, and after the fiends have disappeared, the villagers return, make merry, and each drinks of the enchanted tea. The act closes as, after struggling vainly against the charm, all present save Alexis, Aline and the Sorcerer fall insensible.

ACT II

Exterior of Sir Marmaduke's Mansion, Midnight

It is midnight, and the villagers are still lying where they have fallen. Mr. Wells, with a great sense of fitness, has had the more exalted members taken home and put to bed "respectably." As the villagers wake, each falls in love with the first person of the opposite sex visible, Constance and the Notary making one couple.

Alexis is so pleased with his success that he urges Aline to join with him in drinking the philtre, in order that nothing may be left to chance. She refuses, and they quarrel. The remaining characters begin to arrive: first Dr. Daly, the worthy Vicar, who is puzzled because, in a village hitherto rather slow in the matter of marriage, he has suddenly had a request for hasty weddings from everyone -- even Sir Marmaduke. Alexis is none too pleased when he finds that the philtre has led the Baronet to fix on Mrs. Partlet, the Pew Opener. Still, he must live up to his opinions, and there is a congratulatory quintet from those concerned.

Mr. Wells, having caused the mischief, falls a victim to his own spell, for Lady Sangazure, entering, sees him and at once adores him. He, on the other hand, not having drunk the philtre, does not reciprocate, and in an amusing duet endeavours to dissuade her. Without success, however, for she threatens to bury her woe in her family vault.

Aline, having pondered the matter, has decided to fall in with her lover's wish, and drinks the philtre. Immediately afterwards, she catches sight of Dr. Daly and of course falls in love with him. He is delighted at his good fortune, but Alexis, coming in full of remorse, is astounded to find his embraces repulsed. Explanations ensue, and the Vicar obligingly offers to quit the country and bury his sorrow "in the congenial gloom of a Colonial Bishopric."

This is not enough, for Aline is still under the influence of the philtre, and no longer loves Alexis. They appeal to Mr. Wells, who reveals that there is one way only in which the spell can be revoked. Either he or Alexis must sacrifice himself to Ahrimanes. Argument ensues, and the issue is put to popular vote; John Wellington Wells loses and disappears into the earth to the sound of a gong.

All quit their temporary partners to rejoin their old lovers, and Sir Marmaduke, claiming Lady Sangazure, invites them all to another feast in his mansion.

Notes from the Music Director

It wasn't until the impresario, D'Oyle Carte, brought Gilbert and Sullivan together that the long association between these two was cemented.

Before Gilbert, it was Burnand with Cox and Box, a sort of a workshop piece for what was to happen later. Trial by Jury was Sullivan and Gilbert's first collaboration, but it was The Sorcerer that put them into the public eye and ear for the first time.

Look and listen for Cox's progenitor patter song that was to reappear in even more remarkable form with John Wellington Wells in *The Sorcerer*, thereafter to have a remarkable signature life in every G & S operetta.

Above all, these two pieces focus on the dual aspects of happy fate and unfortunate magic, which have an ongoing life in later operettas, but also, nota bene the importance focused upon feline intervention in Cox & Box. Can you remember in which future opera the cat is again unjustly blamed for human foibles?

Artistic Profiles

William Farlow, Professor of Music and Director of Opera for the University of Wisconsin-Madison, has well over two hundred productions to his credit. His career has taken him to Scotland, Mexico, and Canada, as well as throughout the United States, including New York City, Chicago, Memphis, and Fort Worth. He has directed productions for the Lyric Opera of Chicago, Los Angeles Opera, and the Canadian Opera, and has worked with such artists as Placido Domingo, Kiri Te Kanawa, Carlo Maria Giulini, and David Hockney. As a singer, Mr. Farlow has performed major roles in La Cenerentola, La belle Hélène, and Così fan tutte, as well as principal roles in nine Gilbert and Sullivan operas. He has choreographed national touring productions of The Merry Widow and Naughty Marietta for the Eastern Opera Company. As a stage director, Mr. Farlow's repertoire ranges from Handel to Schoenberg and Mozart to Rayel. His credits include major productions of Tristan und Isolde for the Pittsburgh Opera, Turandot for the Lyric Opera of Chicago, and Salome for the Los Angeles Opera. He has directed the Florentine Opera's production of The Barber of Seville and The Mikado for the Lyric Opera of Kansas City. He was invited to be chair of a panel at Opera America's Young Singers' Workshop in Chicago in March 2001 and is a contributor of articles to Opera America's Perspective series. In July 2001, Mr. Farlow directed the world premiere of The Children of the Keweenaw for Michigan's Pine Mountain Music Festival. Past productions include a double bill of the Mahagonny Songspiel and Trouble in Tahiti for the University of Kansas and Doctor Miracle for the Florentine Opera Company. Recent engagements include La Bohème and Die Zauberflöte for the Kalamazoo Symphony, Turandot for the Pensacola Opera, and Tosca for the Midland Symphony. 2005-06 engagements included the world premiere of Alicyn Warren's Mirror Story for the University of Michigan, La bohème for the Midland Symphony, and productions of Hänsel und Gretel and the world premiere of Andrzej Hanzelewicz' Maud Powell: Queen of Violinists for the Maud Powell Music Festival. This year, he returns to the Kalamazoo Symphony for a production of Faust, Opera Iowa for Don Pasquale, and the Maud Powell Music Festival for the world premiere of Jonathan Schwabe's The Bake Shop Ghost. In 2008, he will direct Madama Butterfly for the Midland Symphony. Mr. Farlow has a Bachelor of Music in Theory and Composition from the University of Texas-El Paso and a Master of Music in Opera from the University of Texas-Austin.

The Madison Savoyards invites you to return for the University Opera's 2007-2008 productions of *Pelléas et Mélisande* by Debussy in the Carol Rennebohm Auditorium, Music Hall (Oct 26, 28 & 30) with the UW Symphony Orchestra under the direction of William Farlow and James Smith; *Don Pasquale* by Donizetti in the Carol Rennebohm Auditorium, Music Hall (February 29, March 2 & 4) with the UW Chamber Orchestra under the direction of William Farlow and James Smith.

Gary McKercher was born, raised, and educated in the rural upper Midwest, eventually carning his undergraduate music degree at Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, with Weston Noble. After a year of public school teaching in Minnesota, he spent a research year at Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge, England, singing with several Cambridge University choral ensembles including the Cambridge University Music Society conducted by David Willcocks, longtime conductor of King's College Choir, Cambridge.

His advanced degrees in choral music were earned from California State University, Fullerton (MA) with Howard Swan, and University of Southern California (DMA) studying with Rodney Eichenberger and James Vail (choral conducting), Michael Sells (voice), and Hans Beer (orchestral conducting). Over the past thirty years, he has held college/university choral positions in Wisconsin, Iowa, California, and Kentucky. In addition, he completed post-doctoral study at the American Conservatory in Fontainebleau, France (1987), and in summer of 2004 studied and performed with the famed Tallis Scholars at Oakham, England.

While in California, McKercher sang with several distinguished choral organizations including the Los Angeles Master Chorale, the William Hall Chorale, the John Biggs Early Music Consort, the Carmel Bach Festival, and conducted the celebrated Music at Immanuel concert series at Immanuel Presbyterian Church in Los Angeles.

Over the course of his career, Dr. McKercher has conducted over forty choral/orchestral works including Bach's Christmas Oratorio and Mass in B minor, Britten's Cantata Academica and Cantata Misericordium, Haydn's Creation, Handel's Messiah, Ode to St Cecilia, and Dixit Dominus, Mozart's Solemn Vespers of the Confessor and Requiem, Elgar's The Dream of Gerontius, Brahms' A German Requiem and Naenie, Purcell's Fairie Queen, and Stravinsky's Mass and Symphony of Psalms.

Since 1998, he has been active in and around Madison, Wisconsin, founding the Wisconsin Chamber Choir while freelancing seasonal productions with area musical and light opera companies. The chamber choir has been invited to perform for several state events including the opening of Madison's new Overture Center, Wisconsin Public Radio broadcasts, and state choral conventions in addition to recording seven CDs.

This is the fourth Savoyards production for which McKercher has been asked to serve as music director. His Gilbert and Sullivan credits include *Iolanthe*, HMS Pinafore, Pirates of Penzance, Princess Ida and A Dickens of a Christmas.

McKercher is the new director-designate of the San Diego Master Chorale.

Cast Profiles

Kathleen Buttita (Lady Sangazure) returns for her second production with the Madison Savoyards, the first being last season's Patience in which she had the great opportunity of singing the role of Lady Jane. Kathleen has just recently earned her master's degree in voice from the University of Wisconsin, studying with Julia Faulkner. While at the UW, Kathleen participated in productions of Die Fledermaus and Le Nozze di Figaro, and also sang the role of the Mother in Hansel and Gretel and the roles of Maman/La Tasse/La Libellule in L'enfant et Les Sortileges this past year. Kathleen has also sung with the Stoughton Opera Company in their recent productions of Little Women, The Magic Flute, and Amahl and the Night Visitors. Kathleen is very pleased to once again be singing with the friendly and talented Savoyards.

Albrecht Gaub (Notary) is an editor at A-R Editions, a music publishing house in Middleton. Originally from Germany, he came to Madison in 2004 and joined Savoyards the following year. He has been a chorister in *The Pirates of Penzance* (2005) and *Patience* (2006), and now he is looking forward to his first appearance ever in a lead role. As a member of the Wisconsin Chamber Choir, he is pleased to perform under the baton of Gary McKercher, the choir's director, whom he also thanks for his vocal coaching. Albrecht holds a doctorate in musicology from the University of Hamburg. From 1999 to 2000, he was a postdoctoral Fellow at the Faculty of Music (now Schulich School of Music) of McGill University in Montreal. He has published in English, German, and Russian.

Jesse Hoffmelster (Rev. Dr. Daly), tenor, is pursuing a Bachelor of Music degree in Vocal Performance at the University of Wisconsin-Madison in the voice studio of Mimmi Fulmer. He was in the opera choruses of University Opera's L'enfant et Les Sortileges in the fall of 2006, and Don Giovanni in the spring of 2007. He also studied at the Wausau Conservatory of Music under Scott Hunsberger from 2003-2006; during this time, he performed in multiple recitals, musical theater productions, and competitions.

Julie Hutchinson (Aline Sangazure) appeared in previous Savoyards productions as Mabel in both Trial by Jury/Roses Red and The Pirates of Penzance. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Iowa where she appeared in a number of productions. In addition to her duties as the mother of five daughters, Julie is a private vocal instructor and substitute teacher in Stoughton. She also sings with the Wisconsin Chamber Choir. She would like to thank her husband and daughters; Elizabeth, Rachel, Bronwyn, Emeline, and Victoria, for their support.

Hona Pinzke (Mrs. Zorah Partlet) just can't stay away from these summer forays into the world of Gilbert & Sullivan. A veteran of over 50 productions for many of the area theater groups, 2006 was her "international" year. Ilona was the Irish housekeeper in MTG's Mame, an English maiden in last year's Patience, and a German curmudgeon of a grandmother in MTG's Lost in Yonkers. A far cry from her day job as Clinic Manager for Orthopedic Associates of Sauk Prairie, she finds that the process of putting together a show provides unique opportunities to meet people from many walks of life and backgrounds and ages. She figures she'll walk the boards as long as her orthopedic surgeon boss can keep putting her back together. Thanks for coming and ENJOY!

James Rowe (John Wellington Wells) is delighted to be returning to Madison Savoyards for his fifth show. Past roles include: Reginald Bunthorne in *Patience* (2006) and Samuel in *The Pirates of Penzance* (2005). He has also appeared with The Sun Prairie Civic Theatre (Prince Dauntless in *Once Upon a Mattress*) and the UW Opera (Parpignol in *La Bohème*, Don Curzio in *The Marriage of Figaro*). While not on stage, James may be often found in his garden or workshop.

James Schaffner (Mr. John James Box, Alexis Pointdextre), American tenor, is quickly being recognized as an important up-and-coming talent especially in the contemporary opera and operetta repertoire. He has performed extensively in the United States singing leading and featured roles at New York City Opera, Los Angeles Opera, Oregon Lyric Opera, Lyric Opera of San Antonio, Opera Intimate at Lincoln Center, Opera Boston, Long Beach Opera, and Chautauqua Opera.
