

### Act II

## **Our Story**

### Act I

The British warship H.M.S. *Pinafore* is in port at Portsmouth. The sailors are on the quarterdeck, "cleaning brasswork, splicing rope." Little Buttercup, a Portsmouth "bumboat woman" (dockside vendor) — sonamed because she is the "rosiest, roundest, and reddest beauty in all Spithead" — comes on board to sell her wares. She hints that she may be hiding a dark secret under her "gay and frivolous exterior." While the Boatswain demurs that he's never thought about that, the realist, Dick Deadeye, says he's "thought it, often." Ralph Rackstraw, "smartest lad in all the fleet," declares his love for the Captain's daughter, Josephine. The Captain enters, greets his crew and compliments them on their politeness, saving that he returns the compliment by never ("well, hardly ever") using bad language. After the sailors have returned to stations, the Captain complains to Buttercup that Josephine has not taken kindly to a marriage proposal from Sir Joseph Porter, the First Lord of the Admiralty. Buttercup says she knows how it feels to love in vain. Josephine enters and confesses that she loves a common sailor, but she is a dutiful daughter and will marry Sir Joseph.

Sir Joseph comes on board, accompanied by his cousin, Hebe, and other female relations. After telling everyone how he came to be "ruler of the Queen's Navee," he delivers a lesson in etiquette. He tells the Captain that he must always say "if you please" after an order; for, as he says, "A British sailor is any man's equal" - excepting his. Sir Joseph has composed a song to illustrate that point, and he gives a copy of it to Ralph. Elated by Sir Joseph's views on equality, Ralph decides that he will confess his love to Josephine to the delight of his shipmates, except Dick, who explains that equality is incompatible with the giving and obeying of orders. In horror at his words, the sailors force Dick to listen to Sir Joseph's song before all returning to their duties. Josephine enters, and Ralph confesses his love. Although she cherishes a secret passion for him in return, Josephine knows she is to marry Sir Joseph. Keeping her feelings to herself, she rejects Ralph's advances. Ralph summons his shipmates and their guests and tells them he is bent on suicide. Josephine proclaims she loves him after all. Ralph and Josephine plan to elope that night. Dick Deadeye warns them

that their actions will lead to trouble, but he is ignored by the joyous ensemble.

### Act II

That night, under a full moon, Captain Corcoran confesses his concerns: his crew is rebellious, his friends are deserting him, and Sir Joseph has threatened a court-martial. Little Buttercup offers sympathy. He tells her that, if it were not for the difference in their social standing, he would have returned her affections. She prophesies that things are not all as they seem, but he does not understand her.

Sir Joseph enters and complains that Josephine has not yet agreed to marry him. The Captain speculates that she is dazzled by his superior rank, and that if he can persuade her that "love levels all ranks," she will accept his proposal. When Sir Joseph makes this argument, Josephine says that she is convinced. The Captain and Sir Joseph rejoice, but Josephine, in an aside, admits that she is now more determined than ever to marry Ralph.

Dick Deadeye intercepts the Captain, and tells him of the lovers' plans to elope. The Captain confronts Ralph and Josephine as they try to leave the ship. The pair declare their love, adding that "I am (He is) an Englishman!" The furious Captain is unmoved, and says, "Why, damme, it's too bad!" Sir Joseph and his relatives, who have overheard, are shocked to hear swearing, and Sir Joseph orders the Captain to his cabin. When Sir Joseph asks what had provoked this outburst, Ralph replies that it was his declaration of love for Josephine. Furious in his turn at this revelation, Sir Joseph has Ralph put in chains and taken to the ship's dungeon. Little Buttercup now reveals her secret. Years before, when she was a nursemaid, she had cared for two babies, one "of low condition," the other "a regular patrician." She "mixed those children up and not a creature knew it.... The wellborn babe was Ralph; your Captain was the other." Sir Joseph now realizes that Ralph should have been the Captain, and the Captain should have been Ralph. Sir Joseph's marriage with Josephine is now impossible. As he explains it, "love levels all ranks, but it does not level them as much as that." He gives her to now-Captain Rackstraw. The former Captain, with his rank reduced, is free to marry Buttercup. Sir Joseph settles for long suffering Hebe, and all ends in general rejoicing.

## Stage Director's Notes

When Gilbert and Sullivan were researching sets and stage devices for *H.M.S. Pinafore*, it was only natural that they travel to Portsmouth, home of the Senior Service almost since the days of the city's first Royal Charter in 1194. There, Gilbert obtained permission to board Admiral Sir Lord Nelson's famous flagship, the Victory, and sketch to his demanding heart and mind's content. The set and stage business evolving from this assiduous research were just as important to Gilbert as the assembled cast, as well as characters, text and music he produced with his creative partner. What sensible member of such a maritime race could fail to appreciate the result?

In viewing (and participating in) productions of *H.M.S. Pinafore* over the years, I have been unable to shake the feeling that the deck of a ship should never be left unattended. Even in port, a minimal watch should be set. While I understand the dramatic conceits that require a lessening of the expectation, I decided that, should I ever have a chance to direct a production, my worthy vessel would not suffer in the same way. It has given us a unique challenge. How to have someone on deck at all times, no matter what other action is delineated? How to make it realistic and supportive of the drama without being distracting?

I was also determined that we should have a little more representative crew of the period. Some would have inherited their uniforms and rank, some would have been "runaways to sea" - poor or rich, some possibly indentured or even former prisoners of war who had decided to remain with the Royal Navy. As much as I admired the trim blue and white matching suits of other productions, I wanted a rougher, more varied appearance.

We have worked hard to achieve a "look" and a continuous presence that not only gives a semblance of life aboard a rated-class ship, but also gives us some unique opportunities for additional stage business, humour and pathos. I am deeply grateful to the cast and staff for their willingness to work on this interpretation, as it has required more variety in costuming in particular, and more organizational and scheduling challenges (many thanks to Julia, Grant and Nissa in particular for keeping things "afloat!"). Now, depending on whether you are attending a matinee or an evening performance, it must be nearing 1500 or 1930 hours, and the overture is about to start. Welcome aboard!

## Stage Director's Profile

Terry Kiss Frank has performed as actress and singer, conducted and arranged, directed, adapted, produced, and costumed for Madison Opera, Madison Rep, Opera for the Young, Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra, Madison Theatre Guild, Strollers, Oakwood Chamber Players, Madison Savoyards, CTM, Stoughton Village Players, Wisconsin Historical Museum, MATC, and others.

Favorite roles include Gertrude in *The Sea Horse*, Fräulein Schneider in *Cabaret*, Florence Foster Jenkins in *Souvenir* (to be reprised in May 2011 at the



Bartell Theatre), Marthe in Faust, Blanche in Princess Ida, Betty Jean in Marvelous Wondrettes, Abbess in The Sound of Music, Miss Hannigan in Annie, Mrs. Carstairs in The Secret of the Old Queen, Laurey in Oklahoma!, Mame in Auntie Mame, Bertrille in Babar the Elephant, and Phoebe in Yeomen of the Guard. Previous directing projects include The Very Last Green Thing, and The Thunder of Horses for Madison Opera, and Patience and The Mikado for Madison Savoyards.

Terry also does voice-over work, presents topical recitals and lectures for a variety of clients and has authored and composed twelve musicals for children based on biblical and ethical texts. With the support of her husband, Boris, she manages a small farm and non-profit animal sanctuary and hospice, Bear's Place, just west of Paoli, Wisconsin. Next up – stage directing *Spitfire Grill* for Four Seasons Theatre and Madison Theatre Guild. Terry dedicates her work on this production to the memory of Tom "Low C" Cleary.

### **Music Director's Notes**

Over a century after Sullivan and Gilbert's final collaboration, musicians and music aficionados have still failed to reach any sort of consensus regarding the quality of the music of the Savoy operas. Sullivan's detractors consider it trite and lacking depth, citing the "strophic text settings and simple melodies." His advocates scour the scores, searching for asymmetrical phrase lengths, unusual modulations, and other features that supposedly demonstrate the works' complexity. I've always felt, however, that both camps miss the point, trivializing Sullivan's far-too-undervalued ability to write a catchy tune. A natural-sounding melody is not always "a gift from God," as Brahms put it; to write one often requires as much labor as any other aspect of composition. (The ostensibly simple and folklike theme from the finale of Dvořák's Eighth Symphony, for example, underwent twelve revisions.)

Instead, we should admire Sullivan's settings of Gilbert's libretti for what they are: so brilliantly appropriate that they seem inevitable. The six-fold repetition of the melody in "When I was a lad" highlights the process of Sir Joseph's absurd (though somehow familiar) political ascent and allows the comedy of the text to emerge — to apply any sort of musical heft to this text would be ludicrous. The ballad "Fair moon," with its moderate pace and straightforward phrase structure, perfectly captures the Captain's benign simplicity. But when Josephine ponders her dilemma between love and duty in Act II, Sullivan flexes his compositional muscle, providing the elaborate and virtuosic "The hours creep on apace." Sullivan's music supports and even elevates the drama, without ever subsuming it.

Gilbert and Sullivan fans will notice one significant musical addition in our production: the reinstatement of a recitative prior to the Act II Finale that was cut during the early years of the work. When this passage is spoken (as it usually is), the simultaneous speech and rhymed couplets sound a bit funny to me; set to music they make perfect sense.

Working with Terry and our supremely talented cast has been a joy. I hope you enjoy the performance as much as I will.

### **Music Director's Profile**

Grant Harville is Orchestra Director at Ripon College in Ripon, Wisconsin, and a doctoral candidate in orchestral conducting at the UW-Madison, where he has conducted the University Symphony and Chamber Orchestras and assisted with University Opera productions. Recent activity includes serving as assistant music director of the Madison Savoyards' The Yeomen of the Guard, conducting two performances of David Dies's opera Hills Like White Elephants, and conducting at the Midwest Graduate Music Consortium Convention. In 2008, he was accorded the Richard C. and



Agatha Church Memorial Conducting Award.

Harville has been instructor of Tuba and Euphonium and director of the tuba/euphonium ensemble at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, since 2006. He has competition victories to his credit, including performing his own concerto for tuba and orchestra as winner of the University of Michigan Concerto Competition. Harville's music has been performed by the Wisconsin Brass Quintet, the University of Michigan Symphony Orchestra, and the United States Armed Forces Tuba-Euphonium Ensemble. Harville's vocal credits include solo tenor performances with the Isthmus Vocal Ensemble, the Birmingham First Chamber Choir, and several of the choirs at the University of Michigan. He has served as soloist and section leader at the First Baptist Church of Ann Arbor and Christ Presbyterian Church in Madison. Harville received his Master's in Music from the University of Michigan and his Bachelor's in Music from the UW-Madison.

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
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
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

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## Glossary

#### Act I

**Jacky**: Twists of tobacco soaked in rum (for chewing).

**Soft tommy**: A kind of bread.

Conies: Wild rabbits.

**Polonies**: Smoked sausages named after Bologna, the Italian town where they were first made.

**Spithead**: The stretch of water lying off Portsmouth in the east Solent.

**Dick Deadeye**: A deadeye is a wooden block with three holes, used for tightening or extending the shrouds of a sailing ship.

**Foremast hands**: Those sailors who serve "before the mast" (those below the rank of officer).

**Quarter-deck**: The deck to the aft of the mainmast where the officers and midshipmen had their quarters. Only commissioned officers could linger on the quarter-deck.

**Fore-yard arm**: The ends of the large wooden spar which crossed the mast and from which sails were set.

**Main-truck**: A circular wooden cap fitted on the highest point of the mainmast.

**Slacks**. A traditional nautical term for trousers.

**Hand**: To hand is to take in and furl a sail.

**Reef**: To reduce the area of a sail exposed to the wind by furling it.

**Selvagee**: A hank of rope yarn made into a strap or sling.

Ancestral timber: Family tree.

**K.C.B.:** Knight Commander of the Bath, the second class of the Order of the Bath.

**Nine-pounders**: The smallest long cannons carried on Royal Navy Ships. Ships like H.M.S. *Pinafore* would also have carried 18 and 32-pounders on the main gun deck providing the main armament.

**Pocket borough**: A parliamentary seat controlled by a single individual (usually wealthy landowner); these seats were abolished by the Great Reform Act of 1832.

**Midshipman**: A non-commissioned rank in the Royal Navy just below officer level. Traditionally young men destined to become officers would serve a three-year period as midshipmen before becoming sublicutenants.

**Topman**: A sailor stationed at the top of a mast.

**Grog**: Rum diluted with water (from the nickname of the Admiral who began the custom of issuing the drink to sailors, "Old Grog," so called for the grogram trousers he usually wore).

British tar: A British sailor.

**Cimmerian darkness:** According to Homer's Odyssey, the Cimmerians lived in a land where the sun never shines.

**Ganglion:** A tumor or swelling on a tendon, an enlargement or knot of a nerve. Here it means a centre of force, activity or interest, a point from which many lines diverge.

#### Act II

**Bumboat**: A boat carrying provisions to vessels at a distance from the shore.

**Highlows**: Laced ankle boots of the kind typically worn by Victorian women.

**Turbot**, **Brill**: Both are flat-fish. Turbot is a delicacy, brill is not.

**Farthing**: One quarter of a predecimal currency penny.

"Only brave deserve the fair": From Dryden's ode for St. Cecilia's Day, Alexander's Feast (1697).

**Blue and white**: Blue and white oriental ceramics which were very fashionable in the 1870s and 1880s.

**Gillows**: Suppliers of high quality furniture to the richest families in the country..

**Elysian**: In Greek mythology, Elysian fields were the home of the blessed.

**Cat-o'-nine-tails** (or simply "the cat"): A whip with nine knotted lashes used for punishment.

**Hymen**: The Greek god of marriage.

**Port division**: The crews of men-o'-war were divided into port and starboard watches, one of which was on duty whilst the other rested.

**Fo'c'sle**: (Forecastle) the part of the upper deck forward of the foremast.

**Telephone**: The first telephone message was transmitted in 1876, and the first London telephone company opened in June 1878, a month after *H.M.S. Pinafore*.

**Roundelay**: A short simple song with refrain.

from one of the fables which tells of a lamb devoured by a wolf while off-guard, drinking from a stream.

**feathers**": The fable about the jackdaw which decked itself out in peacock's feathers, only to become the laughing stock of the other birds.

A proverb meaning that there are bad individuals in every group.

The fable in which a group of frogs asked Jupiter to give them a king, and, being dissatisfied with the log given to them, found it replaced by a stork.

## History of H.M.S. Pinafore

This production of *H.M.S. Pinafore* is the 48th annual summer production of the Madison Savoyards.

H.M.S. Pinafore was first performed at the Opera Comique in London on May 25, 1878 (the same year that Music Hall, then called "Assembly Hall," was built) and ran for a total of 571 performances, equalling the record for a London West End run at the time. H.M.S. Pinafore was the fourth collaboration of Gilbert & Sullivan and the one that thrust them into international fame and lasting popularity. For the first time, a current political figure, W.H. Smith, the First Lord of the Admiralty in Disraeli's Government, and the son of the founder of the chain of newsstands that is still in business, was the object of humor in a G & S piece. W.H. Smith had no prior naval experience and was a bit of a prude. Pinafore soon became popular in the United States via pirated, unauthorized productions. In great secrecy, D'Oyly Carte brought a company to New York and opened an "official authorized" production in the Fifth Avenue Theater on December 1, 1879. That opening performance in New York included, in a rare appearance in one his own works, W.S. Gilbert himself, as a member of the chorus of seamen.

This is the seventh Madison Savoyards production of *H.M.S. Pinafore*. It was first performed by the Madison Savoyards in 1968 and most recently in 2000.
