SYNOPSIS Act I: A rocky seashore on the coast of Cornwall

The pirates offer a toast to Frederic who is celebrating his 21st birthday and the end of his apprenticeship. Ruth, a maid who also works with the pirates, explains that when Frederic was younger she was instructed by his father to have the small boy apprenticed to a pilot, but she misheard and instead took Frederic to a pirate.

Now that his obligation to the pirates has ended, duty compels Frederic to devote himself to destroying them. When the men admit their inability to make piracy pay, Frederic explains that they are themselves slaves to their tender hearts, particularly regarding their refusal to take advantage of anyone they believe to be an orphan. Frederic wishes he could bring the pirates back to a respectable life, but the Pirate King rejects that possibility.

Ruth longs for Frederic to take her with him when he leaves. He admits that he is reluctant to marry her, though he is satisfied that, despite her age, she is beautiful. But when he sees a group of lovely young women approaching, he rages at her for deceiving him.

The young women are astonished to encounter Frederic and horrified to hear that he is a pirate. He assures them that he only wants to love one of them. They all reject him except Mabel.

The pirates surprise the girls and anticipate soon becoming their husbands. Their father, the Major General, enters and objects to the girls being married against their wills to pirates. He lies his way out of the situation by claiming to be an orphan. The girls are released from the pirates' clutches, as Mabel and Frederic – ignoring the pleas of Ruth – look forward to their marriage.

Act II: A ruined chapel on Major-General Stanley's estate

The Major-General believes his lie about being an orphan has shamed the family name and he fears the consequences. Frederic will soon march against the pirates accompanied by the police.

Ruth and the Pirate King enter. They explain that Frederic was to be apprenticed until his twenty first birthday but having been born in a leap year on 29 February, he is officially only five. The Pirate King insists that Frederic respect his own sense of duty, whereupon the obedient young man informs him that the Major General lied about being an orphan. The Pirate King and Ruth swear vengeance.

Frederic informs Mabel that he will not reach his twenty-first birthday until 1940. Convinced that he can ignore the pirates' claim, she begs him to remain with her and swears to be faithful, even though he is a slave of duty and feels compelled to re-join the pirates.

Afflicted by insomnia, the Major General enters. Frederic and the pirates seize the Major General and overcome the police. When the Sergeant implores the pirates to yield in the Queen's name, Ruth reveals that they are in fact peers of the realm. With this revelation, they are pardoned by the Major-General, who rewards them with the girls' hands in marriage.

It is the Mission of the Madison Savoyards, Ltd. to preserve the works of Gilbert & Sullivan and other light opera by producing and promoting live performances; to develop the skills and talent of cast, crew, and musicians of all ages; and to inspire, entertain, and educate the community through performances and other initiatives.

The success of Gilbert & Sullivan's operas prompted their manager, Richard D'Oyly Carte, to build a theatre for them on the site of the medieval Savoy Palace in London. The works of Gilbert & Sullivan are so closely associated with the Savoy Theater that they are called Savoy operas, and their devotees are called Savoyards.

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STAGE DIRECTOR



Donald Dexter

has been obsessed with Gilbert and Sullivan ever since he saw John Reed play Sir Joseph Porter, KCB in D'Oyly Carte's touring

production of *H.M.S. Pinafore*. Don has performed on stage professionally in Chicago and in Los Angeles. He has also appeared in movies and in television, including a scene with LeVar Burton in a made-for-TV movie called *Dummy*. More recently, Don has worked for several of the area community theatres. His Madison roles include Old Mahon in *Playboy of the Western World* for Strollers Theatre and Sir Joseph Porter in The Madison Savoyards' production of *H.M.S. Pinafore*.

DIRECTOR NOTES

It is not surprising that after the success of H.M.S. Pinafore, Gilbert and Sullivan would compose a work about pirates. Back in 1879, the United States did not provide copyright protection for foreign works and they and impresario Richard D'Oyly Carte were furious at the number of unauthorized, or "pirated", productions of Pinafore that were being performed in the United States. However, they were eager to capitalize on the popularity of Pinafore, both in the United States and in Great Britain. Gilbert, Sullivan, and D'Oyly Carte hatched a scheme that would ensure their rights on both sides of the Atlantic for their new opera.

Their plan was to delay the publishing of the score until the production had opened, and to stage simultaneous premiere performances in Britain and in the States. They sailed to America in November of 1879, ostensibly to stage an authorized production of *H.M.S. Pinafore*, which opened in New York on December 1st. While this was going on, Gilbert and Sullivan rushed to complete *Pirates*, which was rehearsed by the Pinafore company, and opened in New York on the last day of 1879. Simultaneously, another Pinafore company, located in Paignton, England, performed a very spare production of *Pirates*. They used what costumes they could scrape together and read their parts from scripts that they carried.

The Pirates of Penzance was created as a business venture, written at tremendous speed, and initially produced quickly as well. In spite of the circumstances of its birth (Is this a legitimate way to beget art?), Pirates is probably the best-loved offspring of the G & S collaboration. I believe this happened because both Gilbert and Sullivan were at heart showmen; they were in a club with not only Verdi and Offenbach, but also with P. T. Barnum and Tony Pastor (the Father of Vaudeville). They had an instinctive knowledge of what the public wanted to see. Romanticized pirate stories were very popular, and Sherlock Holmes was waiting in the wings. One generation of children wills to the next the game of Cops and Robbers. What fun to have grown-ups playing Pirates and Bobbies, and do it with an operatic score!

Writing quickly can also lend dramatic urgency where needed, and Sullivan borrowed themes from other composers to parody their work for comic effect. The net result is the fast and funny *Pirates of Penzance*! It is in this spirit of play that we are presenting *Pirates*, and I do hope you will enjoy it with us!

Christopher Ramaekers is Director of Orchestras at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, Music Director of the Lake Forest Civic Orchestra,

Symphony847 and Access Contemporary Music in the Chicago area, and Principal Conductor of the Middleton Community Orchestra. Ramaekers has been Assistant Conductor of the Quad-City Symphony Orchestra, Associate Conductor of the Chicago Composers Orchestra, and Principal Conductor of the Ravenswood Community Orchestra. He has been Music Director of the Quad-City Symphony Youth Ensembles, the Orchestra of St. Vincent's and the



Hyde Park Youth Symphony, and spent 9 summers as Director of Orchestras at Camp Encore/Coda in Sweden, Maine. As a guest conductor, he has appeared with the Kalamazoo Symphony, Skokie Valley Symphony, Salt Creek Chamber Orchestra, Lake Forest Civic Orchestra, Ensemble Dal Niente, and the Chicago Opera Vanguard. Ramaekers can be heard on recordings with Symphony847, Spektral Quartet, and the Chicago Composers Orchestra, as well as with organizations such as Rémy-Martin, and the Dolphin Show at Shedd Aquarium in Chicago.

Ramaekers has held fellowships with the Allentown (PA) Symphony Orchestra and the Peninsula Music Festival in Door County, WI. He was winner of the 2011 American Prize in Orchestral Conducting and holds degrees from Western Michigan University and Northwestern University.

CHOREOGRAPHER Kristin Roling



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
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FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT

GLOSSARY

Act I

Bumper: A cup or glass filled to the brim. **Scuttling a Cunarder:** Sinking a passenger ship of the Cunard line.

Cutting out a P&O: Separating a passenger ship of the Peninsular and Orient line from other ships in the fleet in order to capture it. **Handspike:** A lever, generally made of wood, which is fitted into a windlass or capstan to heave up an anchor or heavy chain.

On breakers always steering: Always making mistakes and getting into trouble; as when steering a ship toward waves breaking on rocks.

Black flag: The skull and cross bones, Jolly Roger.

Custom House: The officers of Her Majesty's Department of Customs and Excise. **Glass:** Barometer (rising indicates fair weather).

Caravanserai: A word of Persian origin meaning a quadrangular inn with a great inner court where caravans put up. **Wards in Chancery:** Minors under the protection of the Court of Chancery. Battle of Marathon: 490 B.C. the Greeks defeated the Persians at Marathon. Battle of Waterloo: 1815. Wellington defeated Napoleon.

Equations, simple and quadratical: A simple equation does not involve the second or any higher power of the unknown. A quadratic equation involves the second power.

Binomial Theorem: Formula for finding any power of a binomial (two terms connected by + or -) without having to multiply it out at length.

Hypotenuse: The longest side of a rightangled triangle. The Theorem of Pythagoras' states that the square of the Hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the squares on the other two sides.

Integral and differential calculus: Integral calculus is a method for finding the sum of small quantities. Differential calculus is a method for determining rates of change. Animalculous: An animalcule is a microscopic animal.



Acrostics: A popular Victorian parlor game similar to charades, in which players guess one-word answers to acted-out clues. The first letters of these spell out the final answer.

Elegiacs: The classical verse form of alternating hexameters and pentameters in which elegies were written.

Heliogabalus: Probably the most dissolute of the Roman emperors who ruled from 218 A.D. to 222 A.D.

Conics: The study of curves, such as circles, ellipses, hyperbolas and parabolas, formed when a cone is cut by a plane. **Floor:** Defeat.

Parabolous: More usually "parabolic". Like a parabola.

. **Raphaels:** Paintings by the Italian Renaissance painter Raffaello Sanzio (1483-1520), better known as Raphael.

Gerard Dows: Paintings by Gerard Dou (1613-75), a pupil of Rembrandt.

Zoffanies: Paintings by Johann Zoffany (1735-1810), a German portrait painter who settled in England.

The Frogs of Aristophanes: Perhaps the best known comedy by the Greek playwright Aristophanes (c.445-385 B.C.). The croaking chorus goes "Brekekekex, ko-ax, ko-ax"). **Washing bill:** Laundry list.

Babylonic cuneiform: The script of the ancient Babylonians, so called because of its wedge shaped letters.

Caractacus's uniform: Caractacus is the Roman name for the British chief Caradoc who fiercely resisted the Romans after their invasion of Britain in 43 A.D. John H. Foley's 1859 sculpture of Caractacus in front of London's Mansion House suggests that "Caractacus's uniform" was little more than a loincloth.

Fugue: Polyphonic composition in which a short melodic theme is introduced by one part and taken up by the others.

Pinafore: A reference to Gilbert and Sullivan's previous show which had been a great success both in Britain and America.

Mamelon: An earthwork in the form of a rounded mound suitable for use in an ambush or sniping attack.

Ravelin: A detached outwork, outside the main ditch of a fort.

Mauser Rifle: A rifle developed for use by the Prussian Army in the early 1870s.

Commisariat: The provisioning branch of the Army.

Sorties and surprises: Sudden movement of besieged troops upon the besiegers.

Sat-a-gee: Ridden a horse, "gee-gee" being a childish name for a horse.

Emollient: An ointment that softens the skin, but here used figuratively.

Dimity: A stout cotton cloth, ribbed and figured.

Act II

Stucco: A fine plaster used as a coating for walls or internal decorations.

Escutcheon: Shield displaying heraldic insignia; the family crest.

Emeutes: A French term for riots or brawls. **Felon:** One who has committed a felony such as murder or burglary.

Coster: Costermonger, street vendor of fruit, fish, etc.

Centrebit: A carpenter's boring tool. Life preserver: A stick or bludgeon loaded with lead, intended for self-defense.

Silent matches: Matches made by coating wooden sticks with sulphur and tipped with chlorate of potash which were ignited by dipping them in a bottle of asbestos and sulphuric acid and so ignited silently.

Skeleton(ic) keys: A key fitting many locks by having the interior of the bit hollowed. **Unshriven:** Without having made confession and receiving absolution.

Unannealed (unaneled): Without having been anointed. Part of the last rites, administered to a dying person in the Roman Catholic church is anointing with oil. **Mien:** Demeanour, bearing, outward behaviour.

Central Criminal Court: The Old Bailey, the major criminal court in the land since 1834. **House of Peers:** The House of Lords, the upper house of the British Parliament.
